Whether or not you were a fan of John Denver, you probably equate his song "Rocky Mountain High" with the state of Colorado. It's "way up there!" Not only is Colorado "high" in terms of elevation, it's also "high" in terms of popularity. Winter, spring, summer, and fall, people head up into "the high country" in droves. From breathtaking scenery to sheer excitement on the slopes,

Colorado ranks high on the scale of destinations to visit.

I personally remember the thrill-of-a-lifetime hike to the summit of Mt. Elbert. At 14,433 feet, it's the highest peak in Colorado and the second highest in the lower-48 states. There was nothing higher in the area, and the vistas from the top were awesome!

Sickness, sudden tragedy, heartbreaking loss, a continuing problem with drugs and alcohol, or an unexpected pregnancy can seriously affect one's view of life. In the interviews we hold and the residents we accept at *New Beginnings — A Home for Mothers*, it is almost universal that something went terribly wrong in the lives

of these women. What once was a fairly good life might seem to come to a sudden and screeching halt. The view from where they stand isn't all that great; in fact, it's just plain lousy.

Thank God He didn't view His creation the same way. What better news can be shared with these young mothers than the fact that when our first parents believed Satan's lies and fell

headlong into sin, our gracious and loving God didn't turn away from us. Instead, He looked for a solution to His creatures' problem. What we share with our residents is the wonder of wonders that our heavenly Father looked to His own Son to solve sinful mankind's horrible predicament. He would send His own Son to become one of us so that Jesus could live the perfect life we couldn't possibly live and die innocently to pay our horrible debt.

parent a child (at least at the present time) there is the choice of placing their child for adoption. Although certainly "the loving choice," it is still a tremendous struggle for these women to make that decision. At *New Beginnings* many residents waver back and forth between their natural maternal instincts and the difficulties parenting would mean for them. Some residents are just not mature enough at their young age to be a good mother.

Another element in the "parent or place" decision are the feelings of the young mother-to-be's parents and the baby's father. Grandparents on both sides are sometimes the "forgotten" parties in an adoption decision, but they are also a key element. Often the baby is their first grandchild. Despite the initial dismay
