Parenting 101 By Liz Seelow

“How do I raise my child?” This is an often-asked question here at *New Beginnings*. The challenges of discipline, bed times, feedings and play time all make the list as residents work at developing their parenting skills. Adding to the challenge is the fact that many of the mothers do not have stable backgrounds or role models to draw from.

The number one challenge for the women is the aspect of discipline.

“Should we spank or use time outs?”

“When they act up at dinner should we remove them from the situation or just ignore it?”

Many of the mothers are hesitant because the “discipline” they received as children, teenagers and even as adults was inappropriate by any standard. Unwarranted abuse both verbally and physically is what they are most accustomed to. The residents acknowledge that this is not the path they want to take with their children. However, they simply don’t know from experience what is appropriate and where to draw the line. Many will do the exact opposite of what they saw as children. They take a passive approach in which the only reaction to their child’s bad behavior is to say “no.” The result is a defiant child who doesn’t listen. It doesn’t take long to realize that this approach does not work.

Another significant challenge facing the mothers is bedtime. Loving parents, like the *New Beginnings* residents, hate to see their children cry, but experienced parents know that letting them cry may be the only way to develop and maintain a consistent bedtime. It becomes frustrating for the mothers when they have no time to get tasks done, because their children aren’t in bed at an appropriate time.

Thankfully, we are blessed with wonderful house parents. Ray and Joanne Solofra are truly models of Christian parenting. They raised eight children of their own and generously impart the wisdom of experience to our residents. The mothers value the training they receive from Ray and Joanne as they work to become effective Christian parents.

Letters From Home

My name is Tara Pouppirt. I am 29 years old. I have a beautiful baby boy name Isaac whom is going on two years old and lives here at New Beginnings with me. I also have my handsome man Dawson whom is 11 years old and stays with my parents till I am able to fully support him.

It took me a long time to wake up and see the lives that I had been destroying. I've struggled for a very long time with drug addiction and hatred for myself. And whereas I've always had knowledge and love for God, I just chose to put my selfish ways first. After leaving my oldest son behind with my parents my life went into a downward spiral. It still took some time after having little Isaac, and almost losing him or losing myself, to wake up.

I remember God's voice in my head telling me that if I didn't change ASAP, I was going to end up dead, alone on the streets. So with that, I picked up the phone and called the Arapahoe House to put myself in rehab. On August 29, 2009 I was told that myself and Isaac would be joining my two month rehab treatment on Aug 31, 09. I was so happy I called my father with tears of joy for the new beginning of our lives.

After successfully graduating the Arapahoe House, Isaac and I moved to a shelter where I continued to progress positively in life. New Beginnings was a place I was determined to be accepted to since I heard of it in rehab. I came for my interview and for 3 weeks straight I called back over and over again with anticipation for our new home.

Since being here at New Beginnings I have reconnected with God, my family, my kids and myself. I have a job that I enjoy getting up for. For the first time in my life I know that we will be okay. I realize I don't need to fear failure as long as I've got God. Although there are things from my past that I will struggle with for the rest of my life, no longer will I let those things weaken and conquer my soul. Proudly I can say I have been 10 months sober and counting and for once in my life I am proud of myself and can look my family in the eye and see that they as well are proud of me. I say thank you with my heart and soul to God and New Beginnings for showing me such warm love.

The family is God's own institution. The Scriptures clearly teach that marriage is a life-long union between one man and one woman. It is possible to provide a loving and nurturing environment for a child in a single-parent family.

This is demonstrated with the single mothers here at *New Beginnings*. What needs to be shared with the residents is that they can complete the picture in a God-pleasing way. The piece required to complete the picture is essential for all families – not just single-parent ones. It is Christ who completes the picture. While the residents here may have a child whose father is not in the picture, they are not “fatherless” in the spiritual sense. Because of Christ they, and their children, have the most supportive father anyone could ask for: their Heavenly Father.

The women find the encouragement in the Word to keep Christ at the center of their families. A Christ-centered family will succeed. Through daily devotions they are constantly reminded about a great love that they can count on. The love of an earthly father may fail, but their Heavenly Father's love is constant and rock-solid. Christ's perfect life and death have reconciled them to God. His resurrection is the guarantee. The unconditional love of our Heavenly Father is reality.

This can be a hard truth to grasp, especially for residents who have never experienced a loving male figure in their life. Thanks to the Holy Spirit's work in their hearts, the comfort and truth of the Father's love increases day by day.

The single-mother family may seem less than ideal to many people, including the women here. Yet, it can succeed. A Christ-centered home is a place where imperfect parents, even single ones, are able to provide a loving and nurturing environment for their children.
